The Working Lives and Struggles of Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in California

Indian Americans

About the Survey


In November 2019, researchers from PRRI and AAPI Data released a landmark report on Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI) workers in California. The survey of 2,684 AAPI California residents explored experiences and perspectives of workers, many of whom are struggling with poverty.

Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders are the fastestgrowing racial groups (and working-age population) in California and the nation. Between 2010 and 2017, most new immigrants (56%) to California came from Asia.

As with other racial and ethnic groups, the research tells the story of "two Californias" — one where some AAPI workers are financially stable and another in which AAPI workers report struggle significantly. This brief highlights key findings relevant to Indian American workers in California from the full report.

AAPI California Workers Struggling with Poverty Within Each Region


In California, the highest proportion of Indian American adults reside in the Bay Area (49%) and the Central Valley (17%).



Key Findings


Nearly FOUR IN 10 AAPI workers in California are struggling with poverty.

Economic Hardships and Concerns

Share of Indian American workers in California who experienced hardships in the past 12 months:



54% helped parents or in-laws financially



27% put off seeing a doctor or buying medicine

(5) 24% were not able to pay a monthly bill



23% reduced meals or cut back on food to save monev



23% had difficulty paying rent or mortgage

Share of Indian American workers in California who are:



worried that they or someone in their family will be unable to afford housing 51%

worried that they or someone in their family will lose health insurance **49%**

worried that they or someone in their family will **be deported 19%**

Views on the American Dream and Economic **Mobility Among Indian Americans in** California

65% still believe in the American Dream (if you work hard, you'll get ahead), compared to 62% of all AAPI Californians

72% of struggling Indian American workers in California believe in the American Dream

33% believe it is harder to achieve the American Dream here than in other states

39% would encourage young people to leave their community for better opportunities

55% agree that hard work is not a guarantee of success, compared to 55% of all AAPI Californians

Hardships on the Job

Experienced racial discrimination or bias at work **27%**



Views on the Economy, Employers, and Policymakers

Share of Indian American workers in California believe that:

The U.S. economy unfairly favors the wealthy 75%

Public officials do not care what they think 64%

Employers generally see them as replaceable 56%

It is important to organize so that employers do not take advantage of them **76%**
